In percentages, because everyone can understand those (I was tempted to write criteria for what the numbers mean)

The percentage of Primary School Teachers that are Female went from:	78% in 2002	to	80% in 2012
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The percentage of Secondary School Teachers that are Female went from: 56% in 2002 to 60% in 2012

When Julie Ann McCullough was QTU president it was reported in Cathnews that she was "not worried" about the lack of male teachers. She was quoted as saying:

"In our view, it is more important to have a range of backgrounds in schools, people from Aboriginal and Islander backgrounds and teachers with disabilities, rather than concentrating on the male and female teacher role," Ms McCullough said.
