Reason No. 2: Qld's Current Practice of *Social Moderation* Doesn't Work

What is *Social Moderation*?

All other states award ATARs (Australian Tertiary Admission Ranks) based on public exams. But Queensland has been using the less-reliable OP scores based on *social moderation*. *Social moderation* is a system of private teacher meetings.
