Week 7: What Happens in Other States?

| Every other state of Australia | has <mark>comprehensive state-wide final exams</mark> for each subject. These are held in October or November. |

| Every other state of Australia | calculates ATAR scores by statistical procedures, which account for subject difficulty, and are based on exam results and school assessment. |
| Every other state of Australia | publishes their merit list of students who achieved the top scores for their senior state exams. |
| Every other state of Australia | has an established procedure for calculating an estimated score for students who had an illness or misadventure on the day of the exam. No states use supplementary exams. |
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| - | held comprehensive state-wide subject exams, for 90 years |

held comprehensive state-wide subject exams, for 90 years before 1972. The option of 100% exams has always been available in Queensland (e.g. Hubbards School).



***** **NSW** *****

- Well-established procedures: 50% state exams in every subject (incl. PE and Drama)
- No social moderation, so schools have more freedom for the 50% school assessment
- Full transparency of procedures. Both exam results and school results on HSC certificate.

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- Written state exams usually 50%, from 20% (*Music Performance*) to 66% (*Mathematics*)
- no social moderation. Students also sit a short 'general thinking' *GAT* test in June. This is
 used along with state subject exams for scaling school results.
- Students can apply for a *derived Examination score* for various reasons including teacher absence, illness, misreading the timetable, even social or sporting events.
